


I, Samuel H. Seward, late a 2nd Lieutenant

On this 9th day of November, A.D. 1866, personally appeared before me, Judge of the Court of Probate for the District of Guilford, in the County and State aforesaid, Deborah Louisa Gilder, a resident of Guilford, in the County of New Haven, and State of Connecticut, aged twenty two years, who, being first duly sworn according to law, doth on her oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the second section of the act of Congress increasing the pensions of widows and orphans, approved July 25th 1866: That she is the widow of Edmund P. Gilder, who was a private in Company I, commanded by Capt. Isaac R. Bronson, in the 14th Regiment of Connecticut volunteers, in the war of 1861; and that by reason of his death in the service aforesaid, she is entitled to a pension, her claim for which is now pending in the Pension Office. (No. 109, 837.) She further swears that she has the following named child of her deceased husband and herself, under sixteen years of age, who is now living, the date of whose birth was as given below, to wit: Hattie Louisa Gilder born February 18th 1863.

She further declares that she has not remarried since the death of her said husband, nor has she abandoned the support of the child above named, nor permitted the same to be adopted by any other person or persons as his, her, or their child.
