I hope you are will it is a long time since that I have heard from Home has the School commenced yet do you go if you do try to be a good girl and learn all you can, there is not any thing that gives me more pleasure than to know that my children are good, you should all ways be very careful to speak the truth and be honest and unright in all your when you are at play with children you should not take offence at the little things that my happen but learn to govern your temper while your are young it is much easier to do it while your young then when you are older. Alice i love you and think of you every day and I believe you love your Father, do you always mind your mother and try to please her. I hope you do. You must write to me and tell me all about what you are doing how you do. I am getting a little better every day. I have a good appetite. Yesterday I bought some milk and made me some toast for breakfast - for dinner I boiled corn beef for supper I made me a minute pudding we have plenty of baked bread, rind beef other things we have to buy. It is raining and muddy so it makes it very unpleasant getting about I should like to have you see Hearpers Ferry then you might have some idea what distruction this war makes in property. I hope this war will soon come to a close.

It is almost one year since I have seen you. I hope this war will end before long so that I can go Home. For I do want to see you very much. You wrote that your school would close in four weeks. You did not tell me how much you had learned this summer. that is what I want to know When I get Home I expect to find that you have learned a great deal. We are in camp on an open field, that was last planted with corn it is very dirty and hot. I suppose that our selected this lot so that we could see the new recruits if they try to run away. Last week when we was on picket - in the woods, I believe that 50 recruits ran away. Our new mess are not allowed to go out of camp without a guard or Non commission Officer goes with them. I have just taken out a squad for water. We have enough to do, to look out for our con scripts. Alice I want to have you write to me tell me all about what you are doing, how much you more would in your studies & tell me every thing you can think of. I am pretty well. I have omited several words now. (No wonder for I have had to stop several times to wait on the conscripts.

I have received a letter from you this afternoon. I am very glad to hear that Alice is getting better. She must be very careful, dont let her eat everything give yer light food till she gets strong. Caroline I am very sorry that you have to work so hard I hope you will see easyer times. Someday, if it wasnt for hope I dont know what we should do. It seems to me that Nelson Murray is staying a long time away from his Regt. Well Nel is a good soldier. I hope he has had a good time. I have not been examined yet. I expected to have been last friday but was not for some reason. When I find out what that the Doctors in charge are against agoing do with mel will write immediately and let you know. Do Mr. Fowlers folks hear from Edgar Moody very often? What does he write? Is he well? Do you know what Father is doing now? Timothy is really afflicted. How lonely he must be.. Henry did not like to pictues I sent to XXXXXXXXX Nanfred (**M**) it was like the one I sent Emilie. He thought the one which I sent him very good. He said I looked to much. Well I cant help it. You know there is no perfection here in this World. Nothing perfect.

There is a great deal of red tape about the Hospitals, as well as in the Army. At the time of inspection every man that is well enough has to stand at the foot of his bed at attention. Every thing must be in perfect order or the inspector will find fault. I hope some day private will be on an Equal with shoulder straps. (or Rascals) many privates are more worthy of wearing shoulder straps than the men are that wear them. Caroline I dont want you to send me any bundle until I send for one. How soon do you get your months pay from the State. I was mustered in for pay last Saturday. If I stay here I shall get my in a few days. I have spent more money since that I have been in Washington. then I ought to. I have bought me a vest & cap have had my picture taken.

I have a little money left yet. I ought to send it to you but I dont like to be without I owe money here. Thave not spent much only for vest cap & pictures.
